

July 18 Garden Tour

1. Geri Bryhan Garden, 9625 Three Springs Rd., Lancaster (Three Springs Addition)

It will feature a water feature with water lilies. On the drive to Bryhans you will drive by the Three Spring's Barn and restored Prairie established by Dr. Erin and Jeff Huebschman.

2. Pat Obma Garden, 1077 Newberry Dr., Lancaster (Newberry Estates Addition, by Schriener's Park)

The Obma garden has an eclectic mixture of beds, containing annuals, perennials, grasses, tropical plants, and a focus on container gardening. The front entry will welcome you with containers filled with spikes of color. A small pond by the patio is a welcome and relaxing atmosphere with a variety of ferns, hostas, lilies, and coral bells. A small raised bed is filled with herbs and vegetables.

3. Delores Dahlgren Garden, 746 Pleasant St., Lancaster

Delores and Dan have a whimsical garden with a collection of recycled and repurposed lawn ornaments. Delores calls her garden a "Friendship Garden". She has a collection of plants that she has been bestowed. These plants form a bond with cherished memories that evoke a personal connection. They also have a large rock pile collection from their travels. The geological specimens have often been used for study at Lancaster Schools.

4. Corey Weydert Garden, 3515 Taylor St., Lancaster (kiddie corner, across the street from the Dahlgren's)

This garden features native woodland plants with a collection of hostas and hydrangeas. Corey and Tamie have created respite areas in their gardens with cobblestone and areas for relaxation and entertainment. There are bark pathways with canopy and a drift wood fern collection, children's clubhouse and vegetable garden. Even though the residence is in the city, you have a feel of privacy through use of landscape.
