

Please meet inside the Gift Room at the Dubuque Arboretum at 6:30 PM. We will have a guided tour of the Conifer Collection. Refreshments will follow with a business meeting. We need two members to provide refreshments for the evening. Let Terry know if you can do this. MOZENA CONIFER COLLECTION

Are you looking for something new and inspiring at the Dubuque Arboretum? Drive around the circle and take a left at McLean Lane. Just before the war memorial and on your right, you will see three new conifer beds, artfully mixed with a couple of stunning Japanese Maples and limestone rock. These new garden beds are a perfect complement to our Walter and Hermsen conifer collections.

Why conifers? "I've become more exposed to conifers as a unique way to give our beds a different look as they add contrast and texture to our landscape," says Jeffrey Mozena. In particular, dwarf conifers are more manageable as they come in landscape size (will not outgrow your yard.) "We incorporated conifers in Premier Bank, Asbury office," continues Jeff, "and we were trying to achieve a look not unlike the ambiance of Eagle Point Park." They even included grasses in their logo, integrating a look of nature with their day-to-day business.

Jeff worked with Steve Ulstad, landscape architect and Arboretum board member, to design the new beds. It was exciting to see the ideas take shape during the long, cold winter days. Once the beds were laid out (and after recommendation from the Planning Committee and approval from the board), the green light was given!

This called for a road trip! Chad Blocklinger, Blocklinger Landscape, traveled with Jeff to Boring, Oregon, to hand select conifers at Iseli Nursery. Also selected were conifers for Premier Bank's newly remodeled lowa street office.

Overall, 57 conifers and 2 Japanese maples found a new home at the Arboretum. Chad remarked, "Not all conifers are green or shaped the same." Three unique trees, according to Chad, to look for are:

<u>Sciadapitys verticillata 'Winter Green' – Japanese Umbrella Pine:</u> This tree gets their name due to the unusual needle structure that looks like an upside down umbrella with just its spines showing.

<u>Picea orientalis 'Firefly' – Firefly Oriental Spruce:</u> If you keep this spruce in full sun, it will stay bright yellow.

<u>Pinus Paviflora 'Taminino yuki' – Japanese Pine:</u> Right around June, this Japanese Pine will show the unusual colors of pink and white in the needles.

Please visit us soon to discover these and many other fancifully named trees such as: Tom Thumb, Whipcord, Little Dipper, Goldilocks, Pixie Dust and Big Tuna.

Watch for the addition of three new adjoining conifer beds next spring bringing even more variety to the dwarf conifer collection.

A special thanks to Dubuque Hardwoods and Fred Becker Quarries for their expertise in assisting with the installation.

Jeff and Janet Mozena donated this garden in remembrance of his Mother, Edna Mozena, who loved her walks in the Arboretum and was an active supporter. In one of Edna's last handwritten

letters to the Arboretum, Edna quoted Joyce Kilmer as saying, "Only God can make a tree" and so it is with the Arboretum.



Mining Museum Project Lead by Wendy Underway
